#### Welcome to the Jewish quarter of Girona

The Bonastruc ça Porta Centre is located right in the heart of the old Jewish quarter, where the last known synagogue of the city was located. It houses the Museum of Jewish History and the Nahmanides Institute for Jewish Studies.

## **Museum of Jewish History**

The history of the Girona's Jewish community begins in very ancient times, with the arrival of 25 Jewish families at the end of the 9<sup>th</sup> century. Three centuries later, a quarter already existed, the *Call*, in which the Jewish population lived. The neighborhood had been thriving along periods of splendor and was the birthplace of an outstanding school of thought headed by the eminent Moses ben Nahman. However, it ended up being a marginal space throughout the 15<sup>th</sup> century. In 1492, the order of expulsion of the Jewish people from the Crowns of Aragon and Castile was the beginning of a new era marked by conversion or exile.

More than 500 years later, the Museum of Jewish History has regained its history and disseminates the memory of the *Call*. It includes archaeological remains of the Jewish quarter and objects related to the daily life in Middle Ages.


